Among others she has worked as a trainer of theatrical game in primary education, she has edited the texts of visual arts exhibitions and has delivered seminars on the use of theatre in museums in the department of Early Childhood Education of the University of Thessaly and the department of Cultural Technology and Communication of the University of the Aegean.
